



First Words in Sign Language

Introduction:

Many children who are late to talk or who struggle to say words clearly benefit from using sign language. Sign language allows the child to use his hands to communicate with those around him when his mouth won't do the trick. This can reduce frustration for children who have a lot to say but can't get it out.

Using sign language in children who are not yet speaking has been studied thoroughly and the research shows that using sign language will not prevent a child from speaking or slow him down in terms of spoken speech. In many cases, using sign language (or other forms of alternative communication) has actually been shown to help children start talking more quickly.

Instructions:

Teaching a child to use sign language can be a tricky thing to do if you don't already know sign language. I suggest that you learn 5-10 signs each week and make those signs with your hands whenever that word comes up in conversation. For example, if you say "Do you want a cookie?" and you know the sign for cookie, you would sign "cookie" when you say it but you wouldn't try to sign the other words in the sentence. Later, when you know the sign for "want", you could sign both of those words as you say the sentence.

Here are the signs for 60+ of the most common first words in children. These are great words to start with for learning sign language because they are the words that children typically say first anyway. Browse through and pick 5-10 to learn the first week and start using them around the child.






