



When Questions Worksheets

Introduction:

Teaching children the concept of “when” can be difficult, especially if the child doesn’t have a firm grasp on time concepts yet. Answering a “when” question is much easier when you have a limited number of choices for possible answers. For example, the worksheets in this pack will let the child choose between night and day as well as between summer and winter.

Start with simple questions like these and work your way up to harder and more abstract “when” questions.

Instructions:

Print these worksheets and place them in plastic sheet protectors (optional). If you put them in sheet protectors, you can have the child complete the activity with dry erase marker and then they can be used again.

Help the child read a question from the left and choose an answer from the right. Have the child draw a line between the question and the correct answer. Keep practicing this until the child is able to complete the activity on his own.

When Questions


